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			<p>proved effective in helping students achieve course goals. I believe my emphasis on weekly writing of volume (approximately 1500 words each week or five poems) ensured students wrote and produced texts on a regular basis, which not only provided them a space for literary experimentation but also allowed them to develop materials for upcoming course projects and explore alternatives to their initial concepts, resulting in improved course projects in both fiction and poetry. However, I believe the rigor of regular writing might have caused some students to fall off early on, especially if they failed to keep up with these weekly writing requirements, but the results apparent in the work of students who completed the exercises suggest the method is valid, and worth keeping. Perhaps a smaller word count early on, building to larger ones in coming weeks, might allow students to ease into the process of writing regularly. On the matter of workshop critiques, while some students provided valuable and considered critiques, others seemed to place less emphasis on the process or fail to provide in-depth analysis of classmates' work. I suspect this is from a combination of lack of effort and fear of providing honest evaluation of others' work, so in future courses I will provide more</p>

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critique modeling as well as emphasize their importance to a greater degree. (10/06/2017)
